Disaster Relief and Community Disaster Education

When a disaster threatens or strikes, your Red Cross is there. This year we responded to 89 local disasters, including 69 residential fires. We helped over 400 people with emergency food, shelter and supplies – more than 100 of these were children.

Local disasters can affect a single home or many thousands of people. This year your Red Cross provided relief to victims of 3 multiple-family apartment fires in addition to assisting victims of the wildfire in Fremont County

Because being prepared can make your family and community safer and sometimes minimize injury and destruction, we presented disaster education information to nearly 2,000 households.

Health and Safety Services

From first aid, CPR and AED training to Babysitter's Training, swimming and lifeguarding, American Red Cross programs help people lead safer and healthier lives. This year, 21,718 individuals learned lifesaving skills through Red Cross classes.

International Services

The international tracing program helps local families find relatives with whom they have lost contact because of a natural disaster, war, or internal conflict. This year, the Pikes Peak Chapter helped reconnect five families with loved ones in foreign lands.

Service to the Armed Forces

The American Red Cross provides communication between those in the Armed Forces and their families. We have a worldwide network that reaches service members wherever they are to communicate a birth, death or illness. This year we provided emergency connections for 880 military families. To make sure these services are known to our military families, we provided outreach to more than 1,013 service members and family members.

A Note about Volunteers

We depend on volunteers of all ages and backgrounds to carry on our work. Volunteers constitute 97 percent of our total workforce, serving as members of the board, instructors teaching lifesaving skills, disaster action team members, office administrators, event organizers and more.

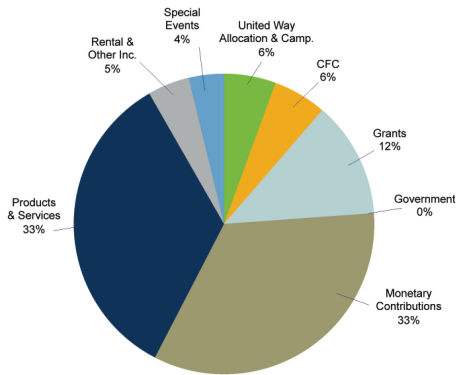
This year, over 400 volunteers made the work of the chapter possible, contributing more than 14,550 hours, for a contribution estimated at \$275,000.

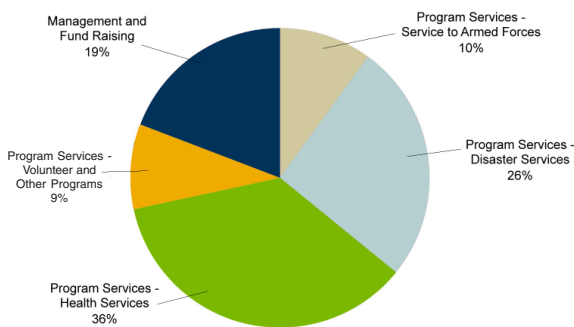

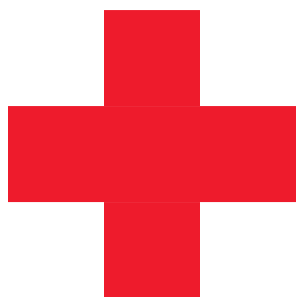
